#### A Little Extra by Ann Kansfield

John told them, "If you have two coats, give one away to someone who doesn't have any." – Luke 3:11 (CEV)

This scripture sure seems to be about material goods—a call to live simply and generously by giving away excess "stuff" to people in need. It reminds me of the *UCC Book of Worship* communion prayer that describes "the vision of the day when sharing by all means scarcity for none."

Sometimes as we pray these words before the eucharist, I think of Luke 3:11 and say, "I should go through my closet and give away my extra coats."

Over time, I've experienced this prayer as a call to mutual ministry with others—something much deeper than giving away extra things. Depending on the day or the thing that's being shared, I may have extra or I could be in need. Some days we have extra love, compassion, space for prayer and deep faith. Other days, we might need a little extra love or compassion, prayer or faith.

Recently my children and I went out for dinner. It was a long day, and they were on my last nerve. Just as I was losing patience with them, our server arrived to take our order. The kids continued to act up, and she remained calm. She turned to take my dinner order and said, "What can I get you?" I said, "I need your patience." She smiled long enough for me to catch my breath. She had extra serenity and without thinking about it shared that with me.





#### Letter from Our Conference Minister Dated March 14, 2024

"For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life" (John 3:16, NRSV)

#### Dear Friends,

I had the occasion this past weekend to visit Alabama. I was invited by my friend, the Rev. Jonathan Pemberton who is the pastor of Greenwood Missionary Baptist Church in Tuskegee, Alabama. Jonathan is also a fellow student at Colgate Rochester Crozer Divinity School where I received my Master of Divinity and Doctor of Ministry degrees and where I am completing an Executive Certificate in Gender, Sexual and Racial Justice. I was so pleased to be invited to be with him, his family, and his congregation. The hospitality I encountered was phenomenal and heartwarming.

As a part of my weekend, I was able to visit the historic Moton Airfield, where the Tuskegee Airmen trained to participate in World War II. This was the only training field for the African American pilot candidates in the US Army Air Corps. To see the place where heroes of our history trained to serve our nation, despite the segregation and discrimination they encountered, touched my heart deeply.

I also had a chance to see the historic Tuskegee University begun by Booker T. Washington on Independence Day in 1881. The University has been designated as the Tuskegee Institute National Historic Site by the National Park Service. Booker T. Washington and Washington Carver are both buried in


the cemetery next to the chapel. The more than 3000acre University is a private, historically Black landgrant University. Its programs include nursing, veterinary medicine, psychology, mechanical engineering, biology and the biologic sciences, business administration and management, and agriculture and animal sciences. To walk the grounds of this historic school and to know the efforts made to educate our Black citizens from 1881, touched my heart deeply. I stood and had my picture taken at the famous Booker T. Washington memorial which proclaims his goal to "lift the veil of ignorance" from the formerly enslaved people.I share these experiences as a reminder of how different many of our histories have been – often depending on race, ethnicity, economic status, and our gender identity and sexual orientation. We are a nation, and a church, which needs to understand the roots of our nation, the difficulties of our citizens, and be clear that we will honor the lives and the stories of those who are different from ourselves.

On Sunday morning, I stepped into the pulpit of Greenwood Missionary Baptist Church as the first white woman to preach there since its inception as a Sunday School in 1903. I was humbled and honored to have been asked to preach. I shared my message from the gospel of John 3:14-21, which includes one of the most famous verses in scripture quoted above this letter. The message is clear, in these weighty days of conflict, division, hate, and war across our world, it is even more necessary for us to unite with our faith in God, our following of Jesus, and our strengthening from the Holy Spirit.

We must not let our difference keep us from experiencing the grace of God, the blessing and hope of belief, and the nurturing of faith communities. In these days, we must lay down our burdens – not to forget the sins we have committed and the challenges we have faced, but to prepare to move into the light of God's love and the resurrection joy of Easter.

My hope for you this day is that you can look, critically and with compassion, at the past errors of the world, the nation, the church, and even individual mistakes and move into the light of love God provides. Let's open our hearts to forgiveness as we travel through the last few weeks of Lent with hope for a brighter future in which we have a role in creating.

At the mid-week Lenten Service that we hosted, one of our visitors questioned the meaning of the cat o' nine tails on our paraments. Several of us had our own theories of why it would be a symbol of Lent. I thought you might like to see the information that was found when I researched it.

#### Understanding the Cat o' Nine Tails:

The Cat o' Nine Tails is a whip-like instrument consisting of nine knotted cords or thongs attached to a handle. It earned its name from the belief that a cat's nine lives represented the harshness of the punishment inflicted upon the recipient. This instrument of punishment traces its roots back to ancient civilizations and was notably used by the Roman military during Jesus' time.

#### **Biblical References:**

In the Bible, we encounter the Cat o' Nine Tails in the context of Jesus' crucifixion and the events leading up to it. In Matthew 27:26, we read how Pilate, the Roman governor, ordered Jesus to be flogged before His crucifixion. The soldiers, following this directive, took the Cat o' Nine Tails and lashed Jesus, inflicting immense pain upon Him.

#### Symbolism of the Cat o' Nine Tails:
